FROM IRELAND (TIRCONNELL) (1507)

Aeneas MacDonnell & servants

left after 13 March 1507; at Stirling 22 April.

Not regarded as an ambassador

£9 to MacDonnell; 56s to servants

Not given audience

Letter delivery - wants 4,000 troops under John MacLean & restraint on Clandonnell supporting O'D enemies. O'D refers to himself as 'a subject' of J4; carried back reply from J4 offering only conditional support

Man from O'Neill 1540?

???

brought J5 a horse

FROM IRELAND (TYRONE) (1566)

Described by Meville as an ambassador

Sent by Shane O'Neill during his war against Queen Elizabeth. Did not have personal audience with MQS; resided with Argyll in Edinburgh. EN AMB complained about him.

FROM IRELAND/ENGLAND (1585)

Captain Nicholas Dawtrey

Commissioned by Lord Deputy & Council, 8 June. In EN by Sept.

Envoy

20s per diem allowance in SC

Poss. audience

To deal with trade cum piracy dispute bet. SC & IR merchants following letter of J6 to LD Perrot of 24.4.85. Also to move J6 to prevent incursions of Scots into northern Ireland. D. has trouble with E of Arran in SC because of D's previous assistance to E of Mar; D corrupts a spy named Kilhold in Arran's household & transfers him to Ambassador Wotton.
